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ALWAYS AMBER

Logline

Amber belongs to a queer generation which no longer wants society to dictate their identity. The teenagers proudly inhabit a spectrum of fluid identities and master their first loves and losses.

Short synopsis

Seventeen-year-old Amber and best friend Sebastian refuse to let society label their gender. Moving through a spectrum of fluid identities, they dream together, party together, and form friendships with likeminded people. The queer teenagers inhabit an open and loving world far away from the judging eyes of others, in which everything seems possible. But when Amber falls in love with Charlie, their utopian world is shaken to its core. Trust issues begin to emerge, and in the midst of it all, Amber has to face going through their transition alone.

Long synopsis

Meet Amber, a gender-fluid teenager. Together with best friend Sebastian, they belong to a queer generation that refuses to let the outside world dictate their identity. In Amber's comingout, Sebastian played a crucial role, opening up a whole new, accepting and loving world far away from the judging eyes and norms of society. Everything seemed possible. Through self-recorded videos, archive material from their childhood and an intimate voice-over, we get a glimpse into Amber and Sebastian's everyday life: hanging out after school, dyeing each other's hair and having sleepovers.

But something is challenging their utopian world. Amber has fallen in love for the first time - with Charlie. Whereas they wished Charlie and Sebastian would get along a bit better in the early stages of their relationship, Amber is now starting to worry if Charlie would rather hang out with Sebastian instead of them. A complicated love triangle is formed and quickly escalates. Sebastian and Charlie are in love, leaving Amber no other option than to break up with both of them. Broken-hearted, Amber will have to start searching for themselves again in a world where everything reminds them of Sebastian.

Through a lot of partying and self-destructive behaviour; Amber is struggling to get over the break-up. But a new future looms on the horizon, as they slowly start to build a new life. They spend more time with their mom, go on dates and find new relationships. On top of that, during their final meeting at a transgender care clinic, the verdict of a long counseling period will decide if Amber gets the diagnosis confirming their gender identity as non-binary, which would finally qualify them to get a mastectomy.

Always Amber is an intimate portrayal of a generation searching for their identities on new premisses. A film about growing up, love and all the ups and downs that come with it.

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Director statement

We—Lia Hietala and Hannah Reinikainen—had two themes that were equally important when we started the process of making *Always Amber* about three years ago. We wanted the film to capture identity-forming friendships and to portray young queer people in a new light.

During your formative teenage years it's often more important to have close friends than a romantic relationship. We explored this idea and ended up with a dramatic film about two best friends breaking up. In the process it became clear that ending a friendship is absolutely as emotionally draining and exhausting as ending a romantic relationship. For us, this film goes out to all the people out there who have had their heart broken by a friend, or have broken one themselves.

The film also portrays a new generation of young queer people growing up in a progressive city, where queerphobia is not part of their close relationships. This is something that we actively chose to portray, hoping to give queer people images that do not focus primarily on the struggle of living in a cis- and heteronormative world. This is not to detract from films which portray this struggle, but we see *Always Amber* as a story which comes after this type of film.

Directors biography Lia Hietala

Born 1993 in Stockholm, Sweden, Hietala has her main base in Stockholm but her first short film If I Say No (2016) is financed and takes place in Norway. The film awarded her the Nordnorsk Film Center's scholarship Springbett, which resulted in her second short film My Gay Sister (2017). The film became very successful and won the world's most prestigious queer film prize: the Teddy Award for best short film, at the Berlin International Film Festival. Hietala continues to work with both fiction and documentary and is currently studying for a bachelor in fine arts at The University of Arts, Crafts and Design in Stockholm. Always Amber is her first feature film.

Hannah Reinikainen

Hannah Reinikainen was born 1992 in Stockholm, Sweden. She has been studying journalism at the University of Stockholm and documentary filmmaking at Biskops-Arnö. Since her studies she has been working at the production company Story, for example as a director's assistant and editor on Shapeshifters (2017) by Sophie Vuković. She has previously directed two short films Nybohovsbacken (2016) and She only beat the one she loves (2017). Always Amber is her first feature film.

Göran Hugo Olsson

Göran Hugo Olsson wasb orn 1965 in Lund, Sweden. Olsson was educated at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Stockholm and is one of Sweden's leading filmmakers internationally. He has made huge hits as *Fuck You, Fuck You Very Much* (1998), *The Black Power Mixtape 1967-1975* (2011), *Concerning Violence* (2014) and *That Summer* (2018). He is one of the funders of the production company Story and has produced several films, among them *Shapeshifters* (2017) by Sophie Vukovic.

Melissa Lindgren

Melissa Lindgren is a curator and producer based in Stockholm, Sweden. She was born in Stockholm 1986 and graduated from the University of Gothenburg with a Master in Fine Arts focusing on curation for film and video. Melissa joined Story AB as a producer in 2019 after 10 years as artistic director of Tempo Documentary Festival. She is also the co-funder and festival director of Cinema Queer International Film Festival, the largest lgbtq+ film festival in Sweden. She is currently working on several projects in early production and development focusing on creative documentaries and art-house features. Always Amber is her first feature film.
